
A Message from the Pastor

Last week we saw a lot of people in costumes

trick-or-treating. Halloween is celebrated in schools and neighborhoods by children dressing up as ghouls, goblins, and assorted imaginary and real characters from history and literature. The masks and costumes used will, in some way, conceal the true identity of the trick-or-treaters.

In ancient Greek times, a mask or *persona* was used to reveal rather than conceal the identity of the person wearing the mask. Moms and Dads should understand this when someone acknowledges that he or she wears many hats in life. No one hat or activity captures the whole identity of the person. That's why we need to wear many hats to communicate our real identity.

Over the past few weeks, the gospels have been looking at the good and bad practice of religion. In authentic religion, love of God and love of neighbor are inseparable. In fact, the fool-proof way that we know we love God is that we love our neighbor. At the Last Judgment, we will be evaluated not on the orthodoxy of our creedal beliefs or the number of Masses and sacramental celebrations we have attended but on our concrete acts of love. Catholics define those essential and concrete acts of love as *the corporal works of mercy* (i.e. feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, clothing the naked, visiting the lonely or imprisoned, comforting the afflicted, welcoming the stranger, burying the dead, etc.).



As William Barclay states, in his commentary on this weekend's gospel, "Here is the test of any presentation of religion. Does it create wings to lift people up, or a dead weight to drag them down? Does it bring about joy or depression? Whenever religion becomes a depressing affair of burdens and prohibitions, it ceases to be true religion." I'm reminded of a snippet from The Colbert Report in which Stephen Colbert interviewed Jesuit author Fr. James, Martin, SJ (official Chaplain for the Colbert Nation) and asked him, "Why are you people (religious leaders) doing such a bad Public Relations job? God's popularity and ratings are down!"

Alright God, Lead me.

Jesus saves some of his sharpest criticism in the gospels for religious leaders. Why? They like the trappings of religious practice. They like wearing broad *phylacteries*. These *tephillin* or *phylacteries* are like little leather boxes. These were worn one on the wrist and one on the forehead. They contained a piece of parchment with one of four passages from scripture written on it. When prayerful Jews looked on them, they were reminded about the authentic practice of their faith.

But Jesus will often refer to the Jewish religious leaders as hypocrites. In other words, they are people who pre-



tend to be what they are not. They don't practice what they preach. They talk the talk but don't walk the walk. They don't do the things that they advise others to do. Instead of being genuine, they are phony. Instead of being the *real thing*, they are *posers*. Instead of being trustworthy, they are untrustworthy. So, Jesus concludes, "Do what they say but don't do what they do."

As we conclude another liturgical year, let us examine and recommit ourselves to an authentic practice of our faith. May our love of God—expressed in our love of neighbor—be an in-


spiring and encouraging example to our children, our neighbors, our community and our world.

We hosted our annual whole school Halloween Parade of costumes. Even our staff dressed up! What a fun way to celebrate "All Hallows Eve!" Our 2nd and 5th graders partnered in leading us through a beautiful All Saints' Day Mass. Our students spend the month of November studying about saints. Each week in our morning announcements, we learn about saints that have shown the

virtues we are learning. The virtues we have been learning about recently include: circumspection, industriousness, foresight, and trustworthiness. St. John Bosco showed the virtue of foresight in the way he trained young men to embrace holiness through positive ways instead of punishments. Blessed Anne-Marie Jovouhey grew up in France during the French Revolution when Catholics were not free to practice their faith.

Since there were no convents in France at the time for her to join, she started her own religious community that ran free schools for poor children. Years later, the French government recognized how trustworthy Blessed Anne-Marie was and asked her to teach newly released prisoners in French Guiana.





We are learning and growing in so many ways! The kindergartners have been learning about the five senses by making slime, then brainstorming adjectives such as "cold" and "goopy" to describe how slime feels. The second graders created all types of bird houses while studying about different types of birds. The third graders have been learning about various types of communities. Our sixth graders are learning

about the structure of cells. Seventh grade students are creating graphic novel hero stories based on their reading of the Odyssey. So much learning and growing each and every day!

May we remember the Beatitudes Jesus gave us a guide for living our lives as people of God.. "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comfort-

ed. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land. Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied. Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.
