A Message from the Pastor

Rabbi Moshe Leib of Sassov declared to his disciples: "I have learned how we must truly love our neighbor from a conversation between two villagers which I overheard.

> The first said: 'Tell me, friend Ivan, do you love me?' The second responded: 'I love you deeply.' The first said: 'Do you know, my friend, what gives me pain?' The second responded: 'How can I possibly know what gives you pain?' The first said: 'If you do not know what gives me pain, how can you say that you truly love me?'

Understand, then, my children—continued the Rabbi—to love, truly love, means to know what brings pain to your comrade."

If we all woke up tomorrow, every person on this planet, with the will to love one another, the old world would pass away in an hour. Imagine loving your enemies instead of hating and killing them. Imagine binding up the wounds of society rather than ignoring or deepening them. Imagine the fruits of the Holy Spirit—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control—being the universal pattern of human relationships. Being born again makes this "fantasy" a reality, one heart at a time. We don't have to wait for everyone to climb on board. Making things new starts with you and with me.

Last weekend—Mother's Day weekend—we focused on our mother's love for us. For many of us, our memories take us back to our youth when a simple smile and a generous hug would make all that was wrong in our lives right. And over the years, that really never changes. More phone calls were made last weekend in America than any other time of the year. Children sought to reconnect with mothers hoping to hear a smile in their mother's voice that would once again make everything right. Families gathered to celebrate that maternal love. Our deceased mothers were remembered in church services. They were also remembered at cemeteries, and in moments of quiet prayer everywhere.

Mothers and fathers can often embody the Love Command that we hear in weekend's gospel. Love—selfless, complete, and unconditional—marks our identity as baptized disciples of the Risen One. Jesus' commandment of "love" is envisioned in the community of Church that he leaves behind.

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PASTOR'S MESSAGE CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE:

This weekend's gospel takes place in the Upper Room the night of the Last Supper. Jesus has just completed the dramatic washing of the disciples' feet and has further shocked his disciples with the warnings of Judas' role in the events to come. After Judas leaves, Jesus addresses the remaining eleven—though they do not grasp the full import of what he is saying. An ending is at hand; but also a new beginning. Their present friendship is about to be transformed forever into a new community, bound together by the same love that binds Father to Son.

Jesus gives them (and us) a "new" commandment of love—what is "new" is the model Jesus leaves them of selfless, sacrificial, forgiving love: a "new" standard of love that transcends legalisms and measurements, that renews and re-creates all human relationships, that transforms the most Godless and secular world view into the compassion and justice of God.

As a faith community, we are called to "obey" Christ's Love Command. Now the word "obedience" literally means "to listen carefully to something," in this case that new command. Perhaps some days we are up to this. Per-

haps some days we can muster the courage, the strength and the wisdom it takes to "carefully listen" to this command and respond to it through the actions of our life. More often than not, this command can seem like an unattainable goal, it can seem like the title of an old film—"A Bridge Too Far."

We can't do this on our own. That's why God, in his infinite wisdom and compassion, gives us his Word—to remind us when we forget, to encourage us when we are tempted to give up, to strengthen us when we're not sure we can muster the strength or courage to listen carefully and to fulfill this always challenging Love Command. That's why Jesus left us this Eucharist—to remind us of his love for us, to strengthen us to begin again, to fill us with gratitude for his constant and unconditional love of us that evokes a desire to express our gratitude through love of others—especially those most in need. That is why Jesus promises to send us the Spirit—to remind us, to inspire us, to empower us to respond to this Love



Command in our families, in our faith communities, in our classrooms, in our work places, in our city and in our world.

So let us pray for one another today, that we can help one another listen carefully to Jesus' Love Command and respond to it by loving not just in word but also—and most importantly—in deed. So, we pray:



Make us the vision of your love, O Lord, for our own time and place. May compassion be the light by which we walk; may reconciliation be the road we journey; may humility and selflessness be our guides. In our own humble efforts to follow your commandment of love, may others realize your love for them; in our struggles to live your Gospel, may the world recognize your presence in their midst.
