

Dear Parishioners:

As Advent 2021 begins, I'm reminded of the story of a village blacksmith who found an apprentice willing to work hard at low pay. The smith immediately began his instructions to the lad. "When I take the metal out of the fire," he said, "I'll lay it on the anvil. When I nod my head, you hit it with the hammer." The apprentice did precisely what he thought he was told. Next day, he was the village blacksmith.

During Advent, hear the prayer at Mass once again – **"as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ."** Like the apprentice, is it possible to misunderstand what this prayer means?

The gospels from Luke during Advent invite us "to read the signs of the times." At first blush, our "signs of the times" do not seem joyful. On the macro level, some of the signs are sources of distress. One distressful sign is the growing disparity between haves and have nots, between north and south, between first world and developing world. Notice how these tensions played out in the recent global gathering on climate change. As the prophet says, "For those who live on an island of prosperity, the rising tide of want and poverty of course will cause anxiety."



Another sign of our times is the crisis in the church of America. There is the fragmentation of church society – self-identity seems to arise more from what divides than what unites us. There is the privatization of religion. It is now taken for granted that religion is purely a personal affair, a matter between "me and God." This leads to the conclusion that religion is irrelevant to the resolution of society's problems, whether to get vaccinated and wear a mask, or whether to follow social media of misinformation that question the legitimacy of our electoral process.

Another sign of our times is that morality and religious truth are increasingly viewed as only relative and subjective. This means there is no basis for discussion of objective life values. Without a basis in objectivity for what we hold to be true, there is no foundation for community. Another sign of our times is that the church is seen by some as exclusively a place for aesthetically pleasing worship in Latin – notwithstanding the Vatican Council's call for liturgy in one's native tongue to promote understanding of the rituals and Scriptures. As Archbishop Sample says, evangelization is our mission. To attract others to follow Christ means living with integrity the spiritual and corporal woks of mercy. It means listening to the Spirit who is guiding us to new ways of participating in the life of the church, as Pope Francis invites everyone to the next Synod.

To celebrate Advent in a fresh way this year, here are some questions. What darkness in your life and in your world would you like to see illuminated? What breakthrough do you want for this New Year? What sun, moon, and stars need to fall before you can be free enough to sense your acquittal from the shame of sin? What new models of church governance will promote a communication feedback loop between the hierarchy and the People of God?

There is a story of five people who froze to death around a campfire on a bitterly cold night. All had a wooden log they might have added to the fire, but for their own reasons, each person refused to give what he or she had.

One woman would not give up her log because there were males in the circle. A homeless man refused to give his wood because there was a rich man there. The rich man would not give because his log would warm someone who was obviously lazy and irresponsible. Another would not give up her log because others in the circle did not practice her religious faith. A lonely man withheld his wood to show his resentment for everyone who had someone who loved them. The fire died as each person withheld their piece of fuel for reasons that made sense to them. The story was originally told as a poem that ended with these sad lines:

Five logs held fast in death's still hand was proof of human sin. They did not die from the cold without, they died from the cold within.

This season celebrates three advents of Christ. The first Advent was his original coming to the world as a human person in Bethlehem. The second Advent was his return to dwell in our hearts and to shine through us to establish God's reign on earth. The third Advent will be his future coming as judge to complete the human project when all creation becomes one with God.

The words of Jesus in today's gospel urge us once again to be Advent people: expectant, hope-filled and watchful, eager to meet Christ's light in every now. Most everybody knows that they will die someday, but do not expect it to happen any time soon. People make plans, think that someday they will put more energy into eating well, exercising, or spending time in prayer. Today's Gospel warns you to be prepared for your end at all times.

Today as we start the new ecclesiastical year, my prayer is that this Advent will be a joyful season -- of preparing a home for the Lord Jesus to dwell in our hearts.
