#### January 1, 2023

#### A Message from the Pastor

The first month of the year is called January and is named after the Roman god Janus. Janus is the god

of beginnings and transitions. Consequently, Janus is also the god of gates, doors, doorways, endings, and time. He is usually a two-faced god since he looks to the future and the past. The poet T. S. Eliot described this paradox when he wrote, "What we call the beginning is often the end. The end is where we start from."

The Catholic Church dedicates January 1st to Mary, the Mother of God. The gospel for this first Sunday of the New Year comes from Luke and gives us the picture of a young Mary "who kept all these things, pondering them in her heart." There is an icon that captures this beautifully. It is called the icon of *Madre del Silenzio* ("Mother of Silence"). Her eyes look reflective and her right pointer finger is pressed to her lips inviting all who gaze upon her to quietly ponder.

Pondering is a lost art in our society. The dictionary defines the verb ponder this way—"to consider something deeply and thoroughly; to meditate over or upon." It takes time to ponder—lots of time. Tweets and Instagrams are antithetical to the art of pondering. The former reflect immediate, and sometime knee-jerk, reactions. The latter requires lots of time and reflection.

Mary is the model and mentor for all who would learn to ponder. When she was



invited by the angel Gabriel to become the Mother of God, she pondered the meaning of this in her heart. When her cousin Elizabeth described her as "Blessed are you among women," she pondered these words in her heart. After the birth of Jesus in a stable, she pondered the message of the shepherds and the visit of the Three Wise Men. When Joseph took their family and fled to Egypt, she pondered these events in her heart. As Simeon and Anna spoke about the child Jesus when Mary and Joseph brought him to the Temple, she pondered the meaning of their words.

When Mary stood before her son nailed to a cross, this Woman of Silence pondered these tragic events in her heart. When Jesus appeared to her, after his resurrection, she must have pondered this incredible event in her heart. When he ascended into heaven, and as she witnessed young Christian communities springing up throughout the Decapolis, she must have pondered these things in her heart.

Traditionally, people make New Year's resolutions. Pope Francis encourages us to consider imitating Mary, the Mother of God, in the New Year. Let Mary mentor us all in the lost art of pondering.

May we be slow to judgment but quick to meditation on the events that will shape our church, our country, and our world in this New Year. May we imitate Mary's ability to ponder things in our heart the blessings of this past year, the life-giving challenges of the new year—and discover what good God is drawing out of everyone and



everything that will make up our experience of the year 2023. In this New Year may we be slow to tweet and quick to ponder. With this in mind, we pray in the words of Joyce Rupp:

Mary, Mother of Jesus, teach us how to ponder our treasures, how to draw strength from our blessings, as we journey into this new year.
