


Ascension

Dear Parishioners:

Fr. General Arturo Sosa just announced an Ignatian Year to begin on May 20, the 500th anniversary of the wounding of St. Ignatius at Pamplona. The year will end on March 12, 2022, the anniversary of the canonization of St. Ignatius and St. Francis Xavier. The theme of the year is conversion. Go to the parish website to find the prayer for conversion which we will use during this Ignatian year.



The gospel today proclaims that after Jesus speaks to his disciples for the last time, he ascends to heaven. What happens to the presence of Jesus in the world? That is our question today. Let us begin our contemplation of the meaning of the Ascension by meditating on various kinds of presence.

One way of presence is through memory. My mom becomes present to me when I remember her in the garden or cooking or smiling in welcome. Another way of presence is through imagination – for example, as a character in a novel or short story. Still another form of presence can be through symbolism – as the

American flag waving in the breeze symbolizes the blessings of our country, and generates the presence of patriotism in a citizen's heart.

What does this have to do with the Ascension of Jesus into heaven? It is not that we celebrate a memory or imaginary character or symbol. It is that today we celebrate the conclusion of the way that Jesus used to be present in the world, and *a change* in the way the Risen Jesus is present now.

In fact, we celebrate that Jesus is no longer present in the world through his human body as he was when he walked the dusty roads of Israel. The Risen Christ is now present through his mystical body in a real though sacramental way. He is present through the Church – "where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." He is now present when the Word is

Continued from front page: proclaimed, when the bread and wine are consecrated in the Eucharist, and in the other sacraments. And the Risen Jesus is present through the members of his mystical body.

To put it another way, Jesus no longer uses his human voice to address people, his human heart to love people, or his human hands to reach out to people. Rather, Jesus acts through us – you and me. He uses our voice to address people, our heart to love people, and our hands to reach out to people. This is the meaning of what we celebrate today.

Even though Jesus went back to heaven, he is still a transformed human person. This is an important point. Jesus did not simply return to being the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. As a Risen human person, he is present to us wherever we go. As Risen Lord, he also gives us the mission to be his witnesses in the world.

Not long ago, Pope Francis wrote that heaven is not a *place* as much as a *new dimension of relating to God*. When Jesus was taken from the sight of his first followers, his ascension did not end his presence in the world. On the contrary, it meant that the Risen Jesus was no longer limited to one place and time as the usual human person is. Because Jesus dwells in the "God-zone" called heaven (which is beyond time and space), he is present to everyone all the time.

The first meaning of the Ascension, then, is that the Risen Jesus (and every one of our ancestors who dwells in the life of God called heaven) is completely present to every square inch and to every moment of time on the earth. The "Communion of Saints" is not a mere metaphor. Our departed family members and guardian spirits have real access to us all the time – and we to them.

The second meaning of the Ascension is that heaven awaits us, too. When you and I remember the

Ascension, we anticipate what the promise of our life in God has in store for us. Celebration of the Ascension is our human way of renewing our hope in order to face the difficult times in our present.

Where is heaven? Where is the Risen Jesus? He is hiding in the most needy among us – waiting for us to show them the same kind of compassion as the Risen Jesus will show us when it is our turn to die and awaken in his arms.

On this Ascension weekend, ask the Risen Lord to breathe in you anew – so you may speak his word of consolation to everyone God puts on your path. As you begin the Ignatian Year on May 20, hear Christ sending you once again to find the ascended Lord in all things.

WEEKLY JUSTICE RECOMMENDATION

May 23 Pentecost

Why It's Important: "At Pentecost, the Apostles understand the unifying power of the Spirit. They see it with their own eyes when everyone, though speaking in different languages, comes together as one people: the people of God, shaped by the Spirit, who weaves unity from diversity and bestows harmony because in the Spirit there is harmony. He himself is harmony." ...Pope Francis

<u>May 30</u> St. Joan of Arc: Patroness of Military Personnel Why It's Important: "To terminate our endless wars and prevent conflict and desperation in the poor and fragile countries of the world, the United States must first reorient its international affairs strategy towards a more robust diplomatic and development-centered engagement." ...USCCB and CRS

<u>May 30</u> Feast of the Holy Trinity Why It's Important: Our understanding of the Holy Trinity introduces us to the Catholic principle of solidarity. In Laudato Si, Pope Francis reminds us that "everything is interconnected, and this invites us to develop a spirituality of that global solidarity which flows from the mystery of the Trinity."

May 31 Memorial Day Why It's Important: We recognize the debt we owe to those who put their lives in harm's way; we also question the paths that lead governments to the "ultimate resolution": WAR. Let us acknowledge man's affinity to resolve conflict with aggression; fear with violence. Let us admit our tendency to walk the roads that reduce our options, making war seemingly inevitable and necessary. Pope Paul VI famously said, "if you want peace, work for justice." Pope Francis pleaded that "We ask the risen Jesus, who turns death into life, to change hatred into love, vengeance into forgiveness, war into peace. Yes, Christ is our peace, and through him we implore peace for all the world."
