A Message from the Pastor

When I was a student at Gonzaga University the years were 1968-1970—I had the great pleasure of acting in one of my favorite musicals My Fair Lady. There is one scene in that musical that captures the paradox of this weekend's gospel parable. It is the opening day of horse racing at Ascott. We hear the ensemble cast, gorgeously dressed in formal attire, sing:

> Ev'ry duke and earl and peer is here Ev'ryone who should be here is here. What a smashing, positively dashing Spectacle: the Ascot op'ning day.

In this weekend's gospel parable, Jesus takes on the social code of his day. He lives in an honor-and-shame culture where status is pretty much everything, and one of the key places where status was displayed was at mealtime. Guests of honor were seated closest to the host, while those of lesser importance sat further away. And those who weren't invited at all correspondingly mattered not at all. Status was important. . . and it could be fragile. To be invited to a better position at the table of an important host wasn't simply an honor, it could also have tangible benefits to your business pursuits as well. Similarly, to be invited to a lower position could affect all dimensions of your life.

In an honor-and-shame culture, counting is everything. Status, favors, debts, honor—it's all about counting and reckoning and standing and the rest. In-

viting persons to a banquet—whether family, friends, or business associates put them in your debt and made a claim on them to return this favor to you.

Jesus' advice to us is to invite and include the outsiders and the marginalized of our community. What would it be like at our weekend Masses or our gatherings for coffee and doughnuts or parish social events—to invite that person who seems always to be alone to sit with our group? What would it be like to reach out to those who are very different from us? What would it be like, if someone asks us why we're doing this, to say it's because it's what we think God wants?

Pope Francis, from the time he was elected, has been doing something new. He goes out "to the streets and alleys of the town," and invites to the banquet the chronically uninvited: "the poor, the maimed, the lame and blind." Other popes have walked among poor, but we've never seen a pope who literally and figuratively embraces the poor, as Francis does. Like Jesus, in today's gospel, Pope Francis is giving us an example of Christian values and behavior.

Pope Francis constantly calls for greater compassion and mercy. He tirelessly reminds us that we need to give those privileged positions to the marginalized, to the person who literally feels like an outside—unwanted, undervalued, unloved by our church and community. That includes gay men and women. That includes divorced and remarried Catholics. He also asks for a "deeper theology" of women who have also been marginalized. Pope Francis continues to surprise, confuse and delight the Universal Church with his remarkable shift in tone concerning the marginalized—just as Jesus does in today's gospel parable or story.

As Steve Garnaas-Holmes reminds us, in his poem Place of Honor:

Don't think poorly of yourself; that's not it. Remember you are God's Beloved, in whom God is delighted. And in humility remember the same of others. God has no hierarchy, no preferences, only love.

Be aware of the supremacy you internalize, assuming for yourself a higher place because you are white or male or not crazy, in all the ways we favor and judge. Resolve this day to meet everyone knowing they are as honored as you or anyone you honor. In your heart and mind give them the place of honor. For it is only in giving honor that we receive it.

Notice the thousand ways we sort and rank, the ways we assign goodness and privilege, the hierarchies we imagine into being.





At God's table royalty and outcast sit side by side and are indistinguishable. Spend your life at that table and become indistinguishable from God.

We are all equally hearers of God's Word. We are without distinction invited to the banquet Jesus has left us. May these scriptures and this Eucharist help us live the values and actions of our teacher Christ—the compassion and mercy of God.
