## **Transfiguration: But Do You Trust God?**

Dear Parishioners:

The Novena of Grace in honor of St. Frances Xavier begins this Thursday, March 4. It is the moment for God's wonderful Spirit to stir up and nourish the holy story of our lives. Sign up to attend in person at noon, or tune in online through our website at 7:00 PM and ask for what you most deeply desire.

Scripture for this second weekend of Lent remembers Abraham taking his son Isaac to offer sacrifice, and Jesus bringing his closest friends Peter, James and John to pray on a mountain.

These passages are relevant for hearers today. Like the protagonists in these stories, you face the same question: can you trust God?

Recently I spoke with a parishioner (I'll call "Bart") – who has been experiencing a lot of anxiety because a coworker began spreading some lies about him. Bart's anxiety was giving him insomnia, and as he lay awake, his mind kept imagining what others might think and how his reputation would be damaged. I know him to be a person of maturity and strong character, and believed his claim of innocence.

Bart and I agreed that everyone's world has two parts: the part you control with your virtuous choices; and the

part that comes at you from other people's choices. And he agreed that there wasn't a whole lot he could do if another chose to be hurtful. But that recognition didn't help his insomnia, or stop his mind from revving about the unfairness and futility of his situation.

Bart asked me if I thought he was too thin-skinned. I didn't think so, since part of his maturity is his empathy when others are suffering. Furthermore, reputation is important. A person's reputation is precious because it signals to others such values as trustworthiness and respectability. No, I didn't think he lacked freedom when it came to what others think. But I did have another question: *do you think that your authenticity will protect you from evil*, from what Shakespeare called "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" (Hamlet, III,i)?

After Bart thought about it, he realized that he had an implicit agreement with God: *if I am good, you God will keep me safe*. Of course, life doesn't work that way. People have written books about when bad things happen to good people. And this leads me to today's scripture,

**Continued from front page:** and a spiritual question for Bart and everyone else beginning Lent: *do you believe that everything comes from the hand of God?* 

It's easy to trust that good things come from God . . . say an answer to your prayer for return to health, or renewal of a broken relationship. But what about the hurtful choices that others make that impact a reputation – as in Bart's case. Does that come from God? This is a fundamental question of the spiritual life: is God present in everything, working even in the wicked choices that hurt you? Does God respect human freedom so much as not to interfere to protect innocent people from damaging choices?

How you answer this question can make the difference between insomnia and a good night's sleep. Why?

Because the person of faith trusts that God in fact is present in *every* moment of life – not just in the happy times. As Fr. Arrupe used to say, "Not a leaf falls from a tree without the permission of God" (Mt. 10:29).

And God is not simply present in every moment, but laboring to bring renewal out of brokenness, restoration out of loss, and finally, life out of death. Bart's question is not why he's enduring slander, why he feels so threatened by attacks on his reputation, or even why it's happening to him at all. His question is, *how do I discover God present in this brutality – acting as companion, teacher, and guide?* 

In other words, don't spend lots of energy to analyze evil's cause. Instead, see the damaging situation or disappointment or loss as a new chance to trust God anew – as Abraham did, as Jesus did when he came down from the mountain. This does not mean passive acceptance – rather, it means resisting evil with God's help.

What about us? Isn't it true that if you believe that God is good and will keep his promises, life's tests are not as cruel or arbitrary as first appear? The story of Abraham concerns more than Isaac's death. It is about the death of us all – and our willingness to embrace the death in every now.

The question of today's scripture is this: In the light of our mortality, is God good? And will God keep his promises? Abraham is our father in faith because he embodies the final expression of faith that all of us must make. We all face mortality's ultimate sacrifice. We all stand before the terrible relinquishment of everything we hold most dear.

And amazingly, God himself has done the same thing – accompanied Jesus in his self-surrender. "This is my beloved Son," he says of Jesus. God's only begotten child, one of our own kin, has gone through our passages – even the passage of death. And come out alive on the other side of life in God.

Bart saw his spiritual challenge as turning to God especially in evil times. God's Spirit is in fact with you – the project is to pray to discover *how* and *where*. As Lent continues, our prayer is to experience a deeper trust in God.

## LENT PRETZEL

The pretzel is a very ancient bakery item, which traditionally was eaten only during Lent. It ap-

peared each year on Ash Wednesday and disappeared on Good Friday. It goes back at least to the fifth century: there is a Roman manuscript in the Vatican Library dating from that period which shows a Lenten pretzel. As to the shape: It is made in the form of two arms crossed in prayer. The word bracellae, "little arms," became in German Bretzel, then Pretzel. These early Christians ate no dairy products in Lent, so the pretzel was made only of flour, salt and water: It was as simple as it could be.

I tablespoon honey or sugar 1-1/2 cups lukewarm water (100-110 F) 1 envelope active dry yeast 1 teaspoon salt 4 cups flour 1 egg, beaten

Coarse or kosher salt



Add the honey to the water; sprinkle in the yeast and stir until dissolved. Add 1 teaspoon salt. Blend in the flour and knead the dough until smooth.

Cut the dough into pieces. Roll them into ropes and twist into pretzel shapes. You can make small pretzels with thin ropes, or large ones with fat ropes, but remember that to cook at the same rate, your pretzels need to be all the same size.

Place the pretzels on lightly greased cookie sheets. Brush them with beaten egg. Spring with coarse salt

Bake at 425 F for 12 to 15 minutes, until the pretzels are golden brown. (Excerpt from A Lent Sourcebook, LTP)

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
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
