Keep Ready! Be Recognizable!

Dear Parishioners:

Next week is Stewardship Commitment Sunday. How do you want to repay the Lord for all God's blessings to you? Watch for a special stewardship video on our website featuring various parishioners saying why they give financial support to the parish.

Today's Gospel about the ten maidens waiting for the bridegroom is a parable not about sharing but about being ready. Jesus was seen as the bridegroom of the wedding feast, and his sudden appearance was eventually understood as his second coming at the end of time.

There's no doubt about it: the first Christians fully expected Jesus to return very soon. St. Paul and the first Christian authors wrote about it. Yet they were increasingly disappointed as weeks, m

wrote about it. Yet they were increasingly disappointed as weeks, months, and years went by, and Jesus was a no-show. Was Jesus coming back at all, and if so, when? Today's story is Matthew's answer to that dilemma.

The parable of the ten maidens is for those who were losing heart, losing faith, and giving up. Jesus basically warns his disciples to be prepared, no matter what the schedule. The Lord, like the bridegroom, will indeed come, but he will come when we least expect him. So don't be foolish. Be prepared.

Some people eagerly await Jesus to come again "as the judge of the living and the dead." There's so much that's broken in the world. Tensions from our national election are a case in point. Some believers long for Jesus to come and punish the wicked and vindicate the good people – restore fundamental human decency and dignity.



Understandable as that longing may be, like the community addressed by Matthew in today's gospel, you are stuck with the "meanwhile." Until that desired second coming takes place, how are you to live? In today's parable, Matthew offers two ways to handle the "meanwhile" – be *prepared* and be *recognized*.

First, be prepared not only for the visitation of Jesus in judgment and death. Jesus actually comes very often, in many ways during your lifetime: inspiration to help those in need; the out-of-the-blue sense that you should pray; the unease at the back of your mind that you should get out of what is stifling you; leave the situation that is stealing your heart; the sudden impulse to be return kindness for bitterness, to be noble and less selfish.

Then there are the more insistent attention-getters: the death of a friend; the onset of an illness; seeing an old person in the mirror; a flash of beauty in an athlete; the falling-asleep-in-your arms of your first child or grandchild. These are visits from the holy Spirit. If you could only recognize, stay awake and embrace these times when the groom arrives, you would be prepared, no matter the moment of the final visit. This is the parable's first lesson.

The second lesson is to live in such a way as to be *recognized* as Jesus' spiritual kin. As William Bausch says in his essay on the ten maidens, the truly terrible words that Jesus says in the parable are, "Amen, I say to you, I do not know you." Can you think of any more terrifying words in the entire gospel? Jesus does not know you? A baptized Catholic, a regular attendee at Mass, and a devoted giver of alms to support the church? Why doesn't he know you?

The clue comes in another part of the gospel, when his mother and family want to see Jesus but can't get near because of the crowd. So they send word up the line, and someone says to Jesus, "Excuse me, your mother and family are here to see you." Remember what he says? He turns around, gestures to the crowd, and says for everyone to hear, "Who are my mother and brother and sister? Those who do the will of my Father are my real mother and brother and sister."

So it's not your baptismal certificate or notification on your driver's license — "I am important Catholic, in case of an accident call a Bishop" — that will save you. It's only your faith and good works that configure you to Christ, and make you mother, brother, and sister. That is to say, they make you instantly recognizable.

The parable expresses this point about personal responsibility in a startling moment when the five foolish maidens ask the five wise ones for some of their oil. Remember? The wise ones say, "No way." That sounds pretty selfish from a group of supposedly wise maidens. But they're wiser than you think: the fact is that the oil stands for faith and good works, and these are simply not transferable. You can't borrow the oil of faith. You can't borrow another's good works. You must respond to God's call yourself.

For those who live in the "meanwhile," it comes down to this. Once upon a time there were ten maidens. Five were wise and stayed alert to receive the Groom in his many visitations. As a result, they kept their supply of oil full by faith and good works. When the Groom came for the final time, it was a family reunion; the household door was open.

Five of the maidens were foolish and constantly distracted. "There's never enough time," as they went off in many directions, leaving their loved ones neglected, the poor uncared for, and their neighbors unaffirmed in the ways of God. They were just too preoccupied with other priorities than to listen to the whisperings of the Spirit, or to fill their lamps with faith and good works. They had become, alas, strangers. "I do not recognize you," were the last words they heard before the door was shut.

After two millennia of faith practice, it has become clear that the Risen Lord is present at the two most important moments in a person's life: "now" and "at the hour of our death." You are given a brief allotment of time – this day, this hour, this moment. Your challenge is to be present to the One who is always already here.

ST VINCENT DE PAUL

The St. Ignatius St. Vincent de Paul pantry has not missed a food box delivery because of the pandemic. That has been due to the flexibility of our volunteers. Limiting the number of volunteers in the pantry at any one time to one person, unless the volunteers are a family, has enabled the pantry to continue to serve our neighborhood. Here are some statistics for the period October 2019 – September 2020: 22 volunteers provided 844 individuals from 291 families food boxes that totaled 28,597 lbs of food! Additionally, 112 individuals from 50 families received utility and rent assistance. Occasionally the pantry receives thank you notes from grateful clients, a reminder that giving does make a difference.

VIRGIN MARY MOTHER OF GOD PARISH—NYABITIMBO

My cousin, Father François Xavier Rukundo shared with me the concerns they are experiencing during this pandemic, and needed help from me to help open their parish as soon as they meet government's requirements.

Most of churches are still closed in Rwanda since March, 2020 to avoid the spread of COVID-10, but the government gave some of them authorization to open their doors if they have a modern and safe place to wash their hands. His parish is located to the rural area where most of parishioners are poor and even struggling to put food on table at this time because most of activities are closed down, and there are no public benefits like here in USA. Parishioners (2,842) are hopeless and thirsty of Eucharist, and miss gathering to praise God. They have to follow government rules in order to open the church to celebrate mass, unfortunately they cannot afford that any time soon unless they receive financial assistance. From where???.... They don't know, just praying for God's will.

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
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
